# Writing on the Wall

Minimalism, as a movement, was a post World War II creation which shared, as many movements do, its collaborative genesis amongst artists and musicians (although some would argue the musical compositions of John Cage were solely responsible, however, it was much more likely in my opinion to have been a common interest in simplification of aesthetic). It was also, as is recorded so repetitiously in art history texts, a reaction to the intensely emotive and heady approach of abstract expressionism, its precursor of extreme gravitas in the art world. It was under this pretense that the movement, for all intensive purposes, rejected the notion of art as selfexpression and proclaimed its images to be stripped of expressive drive. Instead, images created by visual artists minimalism focused associated with merely upon materials, usually industrial, and the repetition of geometric shapes: an elimination of artistic fervor exchanged for the cleanliness of apathy. Ironically, only a truly feeling group of artists would be capable of authoring such sensitive and poignant commentary on mid-century ethos. What could be more indicative of the despondence of this time period when dissolution and vacancy was the common condition? Therefore, this claim of minimalism mistakes sterility for subtlety of hand. As an artist, I believe there is no such thing as creation absent of inspiration. And, as part of a larger community of appreciators, collectively, we come to understand that art, when successful, is always a broad, but sometimes ambiguous commentary on the present state. purged of extraneousness, and therein lies | its vitality and endless possibility of metaphor from the artist's specific vantage point. Leal's work has heeded the fundamentals of minimalism with its use of industrial media (i.e. rubber. appearance of asphaltum, and rusty nails), all forming simple, clean lines. It has however, gone bevond with the incorporation of organics like bark, pebbles and the titling of one piece Waterfall. Most, absent of color (black), render the relief of a circle also absent of color, save two pieces with theirs in a rich sienna. Like with mid-century minimalists, I believe there is much vitality and sensitivity in Leal's visual reductive style. There is a vacancy that induces selfreflection. Looking upon Leal's low relief wall sculptures is comparable to entering a zen garden from an aerial view. They are lofty, yet simultaneously sturdy of construct in regard to their composition. The circles successfully accommodate the organic balance to the industrial media, an intimation perhaps applicable to the world's present condition. Wayne Leal's work will be on exhibit for the entirety of Perlow-Stevens Gallery's 2007 Summer Exhibit which runs until the 28th of September.
